Penshurst Sewerage Update

Wannon Water, Southern Grampians Shire Council, Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning (DELWP) and the consultants Decentralised Water Consulting (DWC) have shared with us an update on Penshurst Adaptive Wastewater Project through the inaugural newsletter received in the mail. Newsletter No.1 is also on the Council's 'Penshurst Sewer Project' Advocacy webpage with the project reports,

https://www.sthgrampians.vic.gov.au/Page/Page.aspx?Page_Id=3430&nc=5

where they describe the town as "the most densely populated unsewered town within the municipality ... situated on a sensitive ground-water setting near an extinct volcano. "The town has experienced little tourism investment due to the lack of a sewer scheme for cost effective effluent treatment on often small lots. This is reflected in limited tourist accommodation and retail investment generally". As residents of the town, we look forward to the completion of this \$2.1 million dollar project.

History continues - **Penshurst Portraits - Timelines**

(continued from last newsletter)

1920 - Complaint about rabbits burrowing under Kolor South State School.

1920 - Council resolved to place fence around monument in Penshurst. Wreaths placed on monument were being eaten by cows.

1922 - About 75 ornamental trees were obtained from the State Nursery at Macedon and planted in Penshurst Park to replace old pines removed.

1923 - Sir JW Barrett, Melbourne, enquired about the necessity of an ambulance service. Council considered an ambulance unnecessary.

1924 - District Health Officer, Dr Cole, and Health Inspector, Mr Robinson, attended Council meeting and recommended: 1) that council join with other shires in appointment of a qualified health inspector, 2) that all closets be made fly-proof and 3) that vermin-proof receptacles be provided for garbage and these be removed periodically.

1924 - Council in favour of proposal placed through Municipal Association of Victoria that a speed limited of 15mph be imposed on heavy motor trucks. It also suggested that vehicles carrying over three tons should not exceed 12 mph.

1924 - Council discussed question of shifting Penshurst war memorial to the front of the shire hall.

1925 - BM Swift suggested the top of Mount Rouse as a suitable position for the war memorial. Council resolved to remove the war memorial to a new site opposite the shire offices, the base to be enlarged and the memorial fenced.

1925 - Five shires to get together to appoint a joint health inspector.

1925 - Resolution of February 1925 regarding war memorial rescinded after consideration of a request from RB Ritchie.

1926 - Tennis Club asked to remove stumps of the pine trees. Penshurst Croquet Club granted permission to fence in the lawn from tennis courts to baths fence.

1926 - Western District Municipalities' Association reformed.

1927 - Athletic Club applying for loan of shire water cart for the sports meeting on 15/2/1927. Base wage for municipal employees in country shires was 13/8d per day.

1928 - Forming, filing, stone cutting, scoria binding and rolling for French Street Penshurst was estimated to cost £4/13/- per chain.

1929 - Jacques crusher purchased for £720.

1929 - Dinneny & Shcramm ask council's co-operation in the installation of electric light in Penshurst.

COX STREET REDEVELOPMENT PROJECT UPDATE

Works are continuing to progress on the Hamilton Cox Street Redevelopment Project with Powercor and Telstra roadside boring nearing completion. Installation of temporary solar street lighting is anticipated to be finalised by the end of the month, remaining in place until permanent lighting is connected. The NBN contract, which is funded within the project budget, was awarded at Wednesday night's ordinary Council meeting with NBN works set to commence immediately.

Heavy vehicles are reminded to continue to use the Heavy Vehicle Detour as water main works scheduled for the start of July will lead to a full closure of the Gray Street/Cox Street roundabout between Sedgwick Street and Clarendon Street.

Local businesses will have managed access with the closure anticipated to take approximately one week (weather permitting). Further updates with confirmed closure dates and traffic management details will be provided in the next Council update.

Heavy Vehicle detour signage has also now been installed to assist heavy vehicle drivers navigate the re-route. Upon entering Hamilton, drivers are advised to follow:

- From Coleraine Road: Mount Baimbridge Road, Portland Road, South Boundary Road, Mt Napier Road, Petschels Lane, Hamilton Highway and Ballarat Road.
- From Glenelg Highway: Hamilton Highway, Petschels Lane, Mt Napier Road, South Boundary Road, Portland Road, Mount Baimbridge Road and Coleraine Road.
- From Hamilton Highway: Petschels Lane, Mt Napier Road, South Boundary Road, Portland Road, Mount Baimbridge Road and Coleraine Road.

Jointly funded by Council and the Victorian Government, the project has an overall budget of \$4.6 million and will improve the Ballarat Road entry of the CBD by undergrounding existing power lines, installation of new Telstra lines (east side only), addition of a new median strip with street lighting, new pavement (east side only) and a 3m wide footpath.

1931 - Deputation led by Rev. Geo Fisher of Dunkeld and Rev. Pye asking Council to restrict tendency of the increase of sports being played on Sunday.

1931 - Penshurst Cycle Club granted use of grader to make a racing track on the Penshurst Cricket and Recreation Reserve.

1932 - Council resolved to terminate lamplighter's agreement and to call tenders for street lighting in Penshurst.

1932 - Resolved that no logs be allowed to be placed across new gravel roads by contractors without being lighted at night.

1932 - Correspondence from FC Thacker regarding letter from the Secretary requesting payment for interest on rates and stating that he was not a Communist repudiator or a Langite.

1936 - R Schramm, seeking permission to erect an electric light wire across Bell Street Penshurst from the hotel to the butcher's shop.

1938 - Council approved plans for installation of electric light in the Shire Hall.

1938 - (August) President to convene a public meeting in connection with the switching on of the electric light in Penshurst on a date to be arranged.

1938 - (September) SEC Advised supply of electricity for Penshurst would be available on Friday 16/9/38.

A PAGE TO SHARE RECIPES

Western Omelette

Prep Time 20 mins Cooking Time 10 mins Serves 1-2

INGREDIENTS

4 large eggs	$\frac{1}{3}$ cup deli ham (40 g), diced into $\frac{1}{2}$ in (1/4 cm) cubes
Pinch of kosher salt, plus more to taste	
2 teaspoons water	$\frac{1}{2}$ cup shredded cheddar cheese (50 g)
2 tablespoons unsalted butter, divided	Substitute bacon for the deli ham.
$\frac{1}{4}$ cup yellow onion (35 g), diced	Add other ingredients of your choice.
$\frac{1}{4}$ cup green bell pepper (25 g), diced	Nice served with Oyster Sauce.
$\frac{1}{4}$ cup red bell pepper (25 g), diced	

METHOD

1. Add the eggs, $\frac{1}{8}$ teaspoon salt, and the water to a medium bowl. Use a wire whisk or fork to beat until the whites and the yolks are completely combined, with no spots of egg white remaining. The mixture should flow off the whisk evenly. Let sit at room temperature for 10–15 minutes.

2. Melt 1 tablespoon of butter in a 9- or 10-inch non stick skillet over medium heat. Add the onion and green and red peppers, season with salt, and cook until softened, about 5 minutes. Add the ham and cook until browned, 2–3 minutes. Transfer the vegetable mixture to a bowl.

3. Wipe the skillet clean, then add the remaining tablespoon of butter and melt over medium-high heat. Cook until the butter starts to brown, then pour in the egg mixture. As the eggs start to set, use a rubber spatula to push from the edges toward the centre of the pan. Tilt the pan as needed to let the uncooked eggs run under the cooked eggs. Continue until the eggs are mostly set, about 1 minute. The top should still look wet, but not runny.

4. Remove the pan from heat and sprinkle the vegetable mixture and cheese over half of the omelette. Cover the pan with a lid and let sit for 1–2 minutes, until the cheese is melted and the omelette looks fluffy and cooked through.



5. Run a rubber spatula around the edge of the pan to loosen the omelette. Gently fold in half, then slide onto a serving plate. Serve immediately.



Something for the children

Australian Beetles Part 1



GREEN GROUND BEETLE (*CALOSOMA SCHAYERI*)

This beetle, metallic-green in colour is a very common variety. It is sometimes found even in the streets of Melbourne and other Southern Australian cities. When captured and held in the fingers, this beetle emits a strong odour resembling that of carbolic acid. The green ground beetle is a species of the family Carabidae, and its larvae prey on insects.

BOMBARDIER BEETLE (*PHEROPSOPHUS VERTICALIS*)



A member of the family Carabidae, it is a ground beetle and one that defends itself by ejecting a fine spray of offensive liquid when disturbed or annoyed. It gets its name from this capability. Nocturnal in habits, it generally hides by day under stones, bark, etc. This beetle is more common in the Northern States but is found also in Northern Victoria and South Australia.



BANKSIA LONGICORN BEETLE (*URACANTHUS TRIANGULARIS*)

This is an interesting beetle which is very common in South-Eastern Australia. Its grubs, or larvae, bore into native honeysuckle or banksia trees, often eventually causing large branches to die and fall. Adult beetles are found during the warmer months, and in some areas are very plentiful and easily discovered basking in the hot sun.



LARGE BLACK WATER BEETLE (*HYDROPHILUS LATIPALPUS*)

This interesting beetle is one of the largest of our water beetles and is found mainly in Tasmania, Victoria and southern New South Wales.

Its larvae live in water, where they prey on other water organisms. At times, large numbers of these insects may be attracted from their natural water habitat to artificial lights. This beetle is of the family Hydrophilidae, and its larvae are predatory.

Near Christmas one thousand beetles would try to break their way through our windows and back screen door. On the really hot days and nights their noises were added to the chorus of cicadas screaming in the back yard. It was amazing any of us got any sleep, and the sensation of a Christmas beetle burrowing between my fingers has never been forgotten. Here are some Australian Beetles to get to know.
