The Council is back with their **Listening Post on Wednesday 20th July, 7.30pm at the Hall**. It's a good time to bring up any problems with them. The more people who come to the meeting, the more the Council pays attention to the town because we are showing that we care about where we live. The town has some upcoming changes, from the sewerage installation, to changes at the VDC, to the Green Space (which blossomed into a far larger project because the Council decided to support it), and improvements in the Botanic Gardens (grant application in for solar sails over the kid's playground). I can't read their minds, but they do fit in with the plans to upgrade the 'faces' of the towns through the 2041 project we've been waiting years for. Off the top of my head, I can think of the projects I am asking the PPA to be part of .. the Green Space is happening, and so are the replacement of the heritage signs. We need new heaters in the Hall and solar panels for the Men's Shed would be a money saver. We have them on the Hall now thanks to DELWP and the government. What else do we need to look at now that we are in the process of wrapping up the first two? Do you have any ideas?

Speaking of the Green Space, as I wrote last fortnight, it did appear unexpectedly. The frame work is down for the cement, that might also appear unexpectedly. I do ask the Council to advise me when things are happening .. in the meantime, we are looking forward to seeing what the shelter looks like .. I know/think it will be green. Unfortunately we did not get the grant to install water on the site, but we'll still be looking for ways to implement this step.

**7 JULY 2022 GRAVEL GRADERS ARE ON THE MOVE**

Southern Grampians Shire Council grading crews are currently working around the region to complete vital gravel road grading and maintenance works. Between July and August grading crews will be located at the following locations with crews to continue the gravel road network around the region through until late October:

- Balmoral – township and surrounding areas
- Branxholme – township and surrounding areas
- Cavendish - township moving north between Cavendish and Glenisla
- Dunkeld / Peshurst and surrounding areas

Southern Grampians Shire Council Acting Mayor David Robertson said Council acknowledges some of the regions gravel roads are in urgent need of attention as a result of the season's heavy rainfall. "We appreciate that this time of year presents condition issues for motorists travelling unsealed roads and we are working to address these areas," said Cr Robertson. "Council spends approximately \$650,000 annually on the gravel road maintenance program. We have almost \$30 million allocated in the 2022-23 Council Budget to be invested in capital works, major projects and roads across the entire shire. We remain committed to improving road quality and critical infrastructure across the Southern Grampians. If you notice our Grading crews on the road, please take care around the impacted areas, avoid potholes, and follow any changes to traffic conditions as we complete these important maintenance works," concluded Cr Robertson.



7 JULY 2022 HORTICULTURAL SPECIALIST OFFERS UNIQUE EDUCATION OPPORTUNITY
IN SOUTHERN GRAMPIANS

Community members are invited to attend a special presentation by University of Melbourne Horticultural expert Dr Greg Moore right here in the Southern Grampians. Dr Moore is a currently a Senior Research Associate of Burnley College at the University of Melbourne and prior was Principal of Burnley College of the Institute of Land Food resources at Melbourne University from 1988 to 2007. He has been a member of the National Trust of Victoria's Register of Significant Trees since 1988 and committee chair since 1996. Greg has been on the Board of Greening Australia (Victoria) since 1989. Dr Moore was awarded an OAM in 2017 for services to the environment, particularly in arboriculture. Apart from a general interest in horticultural plant science, revegetation and ecology, Dr Moore has a specific interest in all aspects of arboriculture and has contributed to the development of Australian Standards in pruning and amenity tree evaluation. He was the inaugural president of the International Society of Arboriculture, Australian Chapter and has been a regular on Melbourne radio, particularly with ABC 774 and 3AW.

Between 1:00pm – 3:00pm Tuesday 26 July 2022, residents will have the opportunity to hear insight s into all things horticultural, revegetation, ecology and arboriculture particularly within our public spaces.

Southern Grampians Shire Council Acting Mayor David Robertson said Council is pleased to partner with the Friends of the Hamilton Botanic Gardens to provide unique access to Dr Moore for locals with a keen interest in our natural environment.

"We are really thrilled to host Dr Moore right here in the Southern Grampians given his expertise, passion and knowledge," said Cr Robertson. "Residents will be able to attend the presentation in person and will have the opportunity to ask Dr Moore their horticultural questions. The event will be hosted at Hamilton Institute of Rural Learning (HIRL) which is really fitting given the venue's natural connection to the Southern Grampians region. Dr Moore will also share his insights with Council staff working across our parks and gardens teams, providing them with the opportunity to discuss trees in our own public spaces and streetscapes. We can't wait to have him here in person to learn from one of the best."

"Light refreshments and afternoon tea will be provided after the presentation so we encourage community members young and old interested in our natural environment to register and come along for what will be a unique and highly informative experience," concluded Cr Robertson.

Daring Bank Robbery at Peshurst 6th August 1898

£600 Carried Off. Interesting particulars.

As audacious robbery was committed at Peshurst Branch of the Bank of Victoria last Thursday afternoon, when an armed ruffian bound and gagged the manager, Mr Duncan Jamieson, and carried off nearly £600. We take over some interesting particulars from the *Argus*. The manager, who is the only officer employed in the Peshurst Branch, was attending to his books at about 10 minutes to 3 on Thursday afternoon, on which day the other business places take a half day holiday, when a short stoutly-built man entered. He wore a black beard and dark glasses, and as he spoke his broken English seemed to indicate that he was a foreigner. The stranger announced that he had come to deposit some deeds, which were of the greatest importance to him, and in reply to the manager's query said his name was either "Bradshaw" or "Renshaw". The visitor placed a black bag he carried on the counter, and turning to it, opened it as if to bring forth the documents he prized so much.

With a sudden movement, however, he swung around and levelled a revolver at Mr. Jamieson's head, at the same time remarking he had come to stick up the bank. Still with his eyes and the muzzle of the revolver pointed at the manager's head, he clambered slowly over the counter, and ordered Mr. Jamieson to lie down. The manager, seeing no help for it, obeyed the order, upon which the robber thrust a handkerchief into the manager's mouth, tied his hands tightly behind his back, and having secured his ankles in a similar manner turned out his pockets, and obtained the keys of the strong-room.

The robber next shut the door and let down the blinds, after which he proceeded to ransack the

strong-room. While he was thus engaged Mr. J. Buckley, an employee of the local post-office, arrived at the bank to deposit the departmental moneys. Finding the premises closed before the usual hour he surmised that something was wrong, and ran quickly to the police station, only to find that the local constable, Mr. C.R. MacKenzie, was absent at Hawkesdale on duty.

In the meantime, Mr. Lawson the local chemist, encountered the robber coming out of the bank. He walked quickly away to a single-seated buggy, which was waiting for him at the side of an adjacent paddock. He was seen to whip up his horse and gallop off in the diction of Dunkeld. He had just disappeared from view when Mr. Murphy, the accountant of the National Bank, found Mr. Jamieson gagged and bound, and in a high state of excitement, but happily little the worse for his encounter. The robber's revolver and spectacles were found lying on the floor.

An attempt to communicate with the police in adjoining towns disclosed the fact that the wires had been cut on both sides of the township. Mr. Lawrence and Mr. Hawker then left for Hamilton by road, from where they were able to communicate with Melbourne. A. Hawker, who arrived at Peshurst sometime later, brought the news that he had seen a man driving furiously towards Hamilton ...

A PAGE TO SHARE RECIPES

Beef & Bean Burritos

Prep Time 15 mins Cooking Time 30 mins Serves 4

INGREDIENTS

1 tbsp olive oil
 1 small brown onion, finely chopped
 1 garlic clove, crushed
 500g lean beef mince
 1 tsp ground cumin
 1 tsp smoked paprika
 1/4 tsp chilli powder
 400g can diced tomatoes

1 red capsicum, chopped
 2 tbsp concentrated Tomato Paste
 1/3 cup beef stock
 300g can red kidney beans, drained, rinsed
 1/2 cup coriander leaves, chopped
 8 flour tortillas
 3/4 cup grated cheddar cheese
 Light Sour Cream, to serve

METHOD

Step 1

Preheat oven to 200°C. Heat oil in a large frying pan over medium-high heat. Add onion and garlic. Cook, stirring occasionally, for 5 minutes or until onion is tender. Add mince. Cook, stirring, for 3 minutes or until browned.

Step 2

Add cumin, paprika and chilli powder. Cook, stirring, for 1 minute or until aromatic. Add tomatoes, capsicum, tomato paste and stock. Bring to the boil. Reduce heat to medium-low. Simmer, uncovered, for 10 minutes or until sauce is thickened. Stir in beans and coriander.

Step 3

Warm tortillas following directions on packet. Divide beef mixture between tortillas. Spread along centre of tortillas. Roll up to enclose filling. Place in a large, greased baking dish. Sprinkle with cheese.

Step 4

Bake for 10 minutes or until cheese melts and burritos start to brown. Serve with sour cream and salad leaves.
