Good morning everyone,

The community meeting was not particularly long last month. Darren Barber from the Council clearly explained why the budget was so Hamilton-centric, adding that Hamilton, as the main town in the Shire “deserved to shine”. I was thinking about a whole lot of other towns that deserve the same, but I understand their sentiments, and hope that, in the long run, some of that shine might trickle down to the towns that still exist, and those struggling to survive. Perhaps, once the Gallery and other projects are completed, there might be more money for the needs of those small towns? It's a rhetorical question.

It's winter and my thoughts turn to daydreams of slow days in front of the fire (or some sort of heating system). The weather is beautiful and ghastly, usually on the same day. The glimpses of sunshine make me long for the warmer weather, which I would not appreciate as much if we had it every day of the year.

Oh, the meeting? Darren did say that a proposal for a 'caravan park extension' would be presented to Council in August, so perhaps we might get some more powered sites. And we were told that we would have improved Christmas decorations, so we asked for banners instead of tinsel wire-framed ornaments.

We were told that seven out of our eight budget items were 'alive', but we could not work out which one was 'dead' when I listed them.

Talking about the sewerage (well, I referred to it vaguely when mentioning the caravan park) residents suggested that the Council might like

to subsidise the cost of pump-outs of the current septic tanks 'every three years'. Something needs to be done about them, but my heart goes out to those with the new systems that have to be checked and cleared every three months.

Changing the subject, I had a phone call from Dan Tehan's office. They asked us to share Dan's speech to the House about the lack of qualified paramedic ambulances in our local region (there is only one) to our Facebook page "Penshurst Victoria". I know the petition only asks for it for Hamilton, but the ambulance will be available to all of us when the need arises, so to give support to the request, there will be a petition around town that we are asking people to sign. You'll find it at the Penshurst Bakery, Post Office, Takeaway, Supermarket and our AgnVet Hardware stores.

PENSURST FREE PRESS DIGITISED

Family historians and lovers of Penshurst's amazing history will benefit from a \$4000 grant from the Public Records Office.

Life member of the Mt Rouse and District Historical Society, Brian O'Brien, applied to the PRO for a digitisation grant on behalf of the society.

Mr O'Brien said the grant would see the digitisation of the Penshurst Free Press from 1919 to 1928.

"The grant will enable the State Library (who have the original hard copies) to work with the National Library who have the much lauded Trove system," he said.

"Trove has massive collections from Australian libraries, universities, museums, galleries, archives and historical societies. Family historians especially value its extensive newspaper collections."

Mr O'Brien said Trove had already digitised the Penshurst Free Press from 1900-1918. "The grant will enable Trove to make the Free Press available online from 1919-28. It will especially benefit family historians to see what Penshurst was like in that decade," he added.

"Anyone who has done family history knows it's just not about discovering personal details of relatives long gone, but their lives have to be set in the context of the society they lived in at that time. This is where newspapers are so valuable because they are often the only source to show what a small town was like at this particular time for our ancestors, what were the main issues and who were the personalities of the town."

Mr O'Brien said while it was gratifying to get the grant, there was still much work for future town historians.

"It's roughly \$4000-\$5000 to digitise every decade," he said. "The Penshurst Free Press was published until 1980 so that leaves another 52 years to digitise! That's about another \$40,000-\$50,000 needed. I have started it off by applying for this small grant but I hope some future historical members pursue similar grants in the next few years.

There's a lot left to do," Mr O'Brien said.

It was a little line that caught my attention. It slipped past very quickly but it made me stop and think; the words rattling around long after the words had finished making a sound.

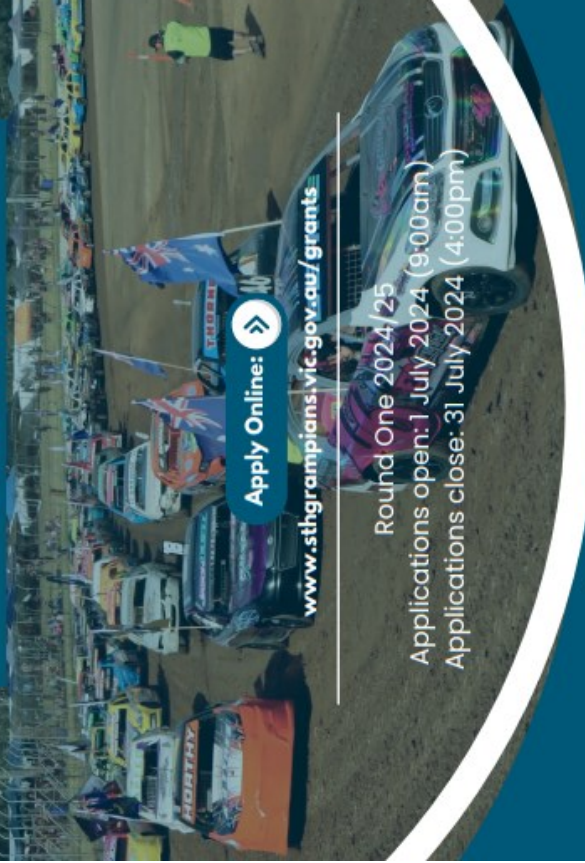

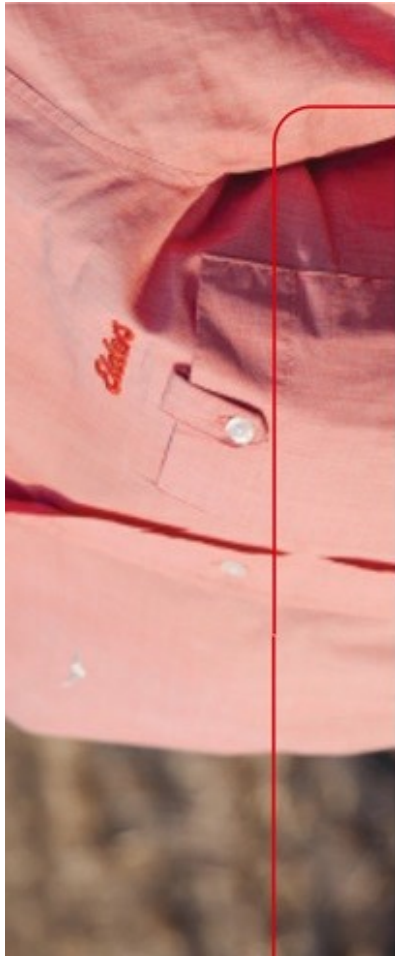

A PAGE TO SHARE RECIPES

Italian-style sausage stew with polenta

Prep Time 10 mins Cook time 25 mins Serves 4

INGREDIENTS

1 tbsp olive oil	2 x 410g cans Ardmona Rich & Thick Basil & Garlic Chopped Tomatoes & Paste
8 Coles Italian Style Pork Sausages	1 1/2 cups milk
1 eggplant, halved lengthways, thinly sliced	1 cup instant polenta
2 zucchini, thinly sliced	1/2 cup basil leaves
200g Portabella mushrooms, quartered	

METHOD

Step 1

Heat oil in a large saucepan over medium-high heat. Cook sausages for 8 mins or until just cooked through. Transfer to a plate.

Step 2

Add eggplant, zucchini and mushrooms to pan. Cook for 5 mins or until softened. Add tomatoes and 1/2 cup water. Bring to the boil. Reduce heat and simmer, uncovered, for 12 mins or until tender. Slice sausages and add to pan for the last 2 mins of cooking.

Step 3

Meanwhile, bring milk and 1 1/2 cups water to the boil in a medium saucepan over medium heat. Add polenta in a steady stream and cook, stirring, for 5 mins or until soft and creamy. Serve with stew and top with basil.

**Garlic Bread**

35cm baguette	60g butter, softened
2 garlic cloves, crushed	1 tbsp fresh flat-leaf parsley leaves, finely chopped

Step 1

Preheat oven to 220°C/200°C fan-forced. Cut bread into 2.5cm-thick slices without cutting all the way through.

Step 2

Combine butter, garlic and parsley in a bowl. Season with salt and pepper. Spread mixture over cut sides of bread slices. Wrap loaf in foil.

Step 3

Bake for 12 to 15 minutes or until butter is melted and bread crisp. Serve.
