Alex Dyson

The guy who's put his hand up to help South-West Victoria get a better deal

Alex Dyson grew up in Warrnambool. As a national broadcaster, he interviewed everyone from rockstars to prime ministers. He's a small business owner, football fanatic, and wants to make politics work again for the communities he loves. The 2025 federal election will be Alex's third campaign running as a community independent for Wannon. His 2022 people-powered campaign saw Wannon become a marginal electorate for the first time in 67 years.

Alex, you have two campaigns under your belt, and you're back for a third tilt. What on earth makes you keep doing this? It is such a good question. I am running because I can see that politics puts many people off, and it's about doing what I can to help and being the change I want to see. I think decades of Wannon being a safe Liberal seat have seen us neglected by the major parties – I mean, look at the state of our roads! I want to see the people of Wannon get a better deal and I want to see politicians in Canberra work harder to win your vote.

I'm in a place professionally where I have the time and flexibility to commit to a campaign. I care about where I live and the challenges we face living in the region, and I get annoyed at politicians and how they treat everyday Australians. They come down here and talk about the cost of living and the housing crisis, and I think, "You were in charge for years and helped cause these problems, and now you're asking us to trust you to fix them?" The big bonus is that I like meeting people, listening to them, and learning about people's lives. I love people's stories.

Does it feel different this time around?

We got so close in 2022. This time there is a real sense we can make history and see Wannon elect an independent for the first time. I'm part of a broad grassroots movement that has around 1,500 supporters, nearly 500 active volunteers and we've just celebrated our 700th individual donor. I feel like I have an entire community behind me, ready to work hard to bring it home this election. Together, we're standing up for Wannon, which is a place that means a lot to all of us.

Do you think you can make a difference as an Independent? You bet I can make a difference! I can represent the true interests of the electorate without being beholden to party lines or big business that has been pulling strings in politics for many years.



I'll be able to say what I think - not stick to a party line regardless of who's in power. Wearing a suit every day is not my idea of a good time, but I'm not worried about protecting my job in Canberra and not being affiliated with a party means that I can make long-term decisions that are in the best interest of the people of Wannon rather than protect my political career. When communities vote for independent candidates, they don't go back. Whether you look at the original community independent Cathy McGowan and now Helen Haines in north-east Victoria, Jacqui Lambie in Tasmania or David Pocock in the Senate in the ACT community independents speak the truth, represent their electorate's best interests and get things done. They're accountable to their voters, no one else.

What do you say to those who have questioned your independence or transparency? I've never been involved with any political party and I am a genuine community independent. It became evident in my first campaign, where my entire budget was \$5,000, that I'd need more funds to compete with the major parties. None of the 700+ donors to this campaign have a final say in my decisions and all are listed on the community campaign website. I've also accepted funds from crowdfunding groups Regional Voices Fund (supporting independent candidates in rural and regional areas) and Climate 200, which supports independents to take greater action on climate change, integrity in politics, and equal opportunity for women. I'd encourage politicians of all persuasions to be as transparent with their funding as our campaign.

Caramut and District Garden Club

Let the Sun weed for you. In the hot weather we are experiencing, this is a marvellous idea which will take 4 to 12 weeks, probably depending on the heat. I have not tried this myself, so can't vouch for the idea but it makes sense.

Mow any grass and weeds, rake up the debris. Turn over the soil, rake the soil level, and thoroughly wet the soil then place one to four millimetre thick sheets of clear plastic over the area and wait for the hot sun to kill the weeds, soil pests and plant pathogens. The moist soil helps the heat generated by the sun to penetrate deeper which destroys more soil pathogens. Make sure you secure the plastic by burying the corners of the plastic or laying a wait on it to stop the wind blowing the plastic. When the weeds look dead, you are able to start planting in the ground.



I have an area I wish to use as a vegie garden and will be using this method to get rid of the unwanted grass. I think I'll just mow the grass as close to the ground as possible, water and then cover with the plastic. I'll let you know how it all goes.

The next meeting and garden tour is on Tuesday March 11th at 10am at the home of Nita Blackwood 16 Koronghah North Rd. Rosebrook. Coming from Warrnambool and turning off the highway into the road is quite dangerous so be careful of oncoming vehicles.



CRICKET CLUB FORMED

There was a splendid attendance at the meeting held in the Mechanics' supper room on Monday night, with the object of forming a cricket club in Penshurst. Mr T. Madigan presided and explained the objects of the meeting. Although it was a little late in the season, it was just as well to get going in order to be ready for an early start next year. It was decided to form a club, on the motion of Messrs J.G Chesswas and A. McPhee. The membership fee was fixed at 5s. The following offers were appointed: -President, A. McPhee; secretary and treasurer, Mr J.J. Turrell; committee, Messrs J.G. Chesswas, J.R. Williams, A. Collins, I. Gunn, A. Chesswas, O.W. Carr, W.O Gilbert and officers ex officio. A committee meeting was held immediately afterwards at which it was decided to send a for a full outfit of material. It was also resolved to form a local competition of three teams and those who intend to play are requested to hand their names to the secretary. Messrs W.C. Gilbert, A. Collins and J.J. Turrell were appointed the selection committee, and will divided the teams as equally as possible. Letters are to be written to the Caramut, Hawkesdale and Minhamite clubs with reference to arranging matches. A match will be played on the show grounds next Saturday afternoon.

Southern Grampians residents are invited to contribute and share ideas for the Southern Grampians Shire Council Plan 2025-29.

The Council Plan is an important document that is developed from community feedback and outlines key priorities that drives the new Council's strategic direction over the next four years. The Plan summarises where Council and the community will aspire to be by 2029 and how Council will achieve those outcomes.

Residents will have an opportunity to meet with Councillors and staff at community engagement sessions across the region with feedback opportunities also available online. Southern Grampians Shire Council Mayor Dennis Heslin encourages residents to get involved and participate in the process.

"I would really encourage all those within our communities to participate in the Council Plan development by attending your closest community session or jumping online if you are unable to attend," said Cr Heslin. "By contributing, you have the opportunity to directly impact the future and direction of our region and that of our Council. Each time we put together a new Council Plan, there are a number of community ideas that feed into budgets and are delivered to our residents. "Throughout February and March, we will be coming to you to meet within your own communities and to understand your needs. "Details of these sessions can be found on the Council website and will be shared via Council's Facebook page over the coming weeks."

Key projects that were developed from the 2021 – 25 plan included the development of key strategies to support waste reduction, sustainable practices, opportunities for youth, ongoing steps in reconciliation with first nations, as well as focus on housing, roads, and an increase in capital works. This plan also supported the development of Council's big three community projects of the New Hamilton Gallery, the Community Hub and also the CBD Revitalisation project.

"The Plan will be built on the views and ideas of community members through what will be an extensive engagement process to develop a quality four-year strategic plan for Council and the community," concluded Cr Heslin.

Big Year for Capital Works

Southern Grampians Shire Council is on track for another significant year of investment in community infrastructure, with the 2024/25 Capital Works Program set to exceed last year's \$18 million expenditure—the highest in six years.

The current forecast for this financial year stands at an ambitious \$23 million, demonstrating a strong commitment to renewal and major projects that will benefit residents now and into the future.

Big Year for Capital Works

Councillors received an update at Wednesday's Council Meeting on progress so far, revealing significant milestones already achieved and exciting developments on the horizon.

Southern Grampians Shire Council Mayor Dennis Heslin welcomed the progress, calling it one of the most productive years in recent memory.

"We're seeing fantastic progress across the board, with essential infrastructure upgrades and long-term projects moving forward at a great pace. These investments will shape the future of our Shire, making it an even better place to live, work, and visit."

Several projects from the 2024/25 budget have been successfully completed, improving facilities and services across the Shire. These include:

Roof repairs and new heating/cooling at the Coleraine Mechanics Institute

Carpark upgrade and new footpaths at Pedrina Park

Drainage improvements at Pedrina Park soccer pitches

Leak investigation and repairs at the Hamilton Outdoor Pool

Sewage works at Coleraine's Silvester Oval

Upgrades to the Hamilton Regional Livestock Exchange

Parking meter upgrades

Regional Town Road Safety Audit

Business case for a road link between Lakes Edge and Mill Road

In addition to tracking progress, Councillors approved further investments using budget savings with \$106,000 allocated for front-of-house or stage lighting at the Hamilton Performing Arts Centre.

Council's capital works program covers a broad range of services, and great strides have been made across multiple sectors:

Buildings & Facilities – 42% of the budget is already spent on renewals and upgrades

Plant & Equipment - 70% of expenditure completed

Library Acquisitions – 50% of scheduled purchases finalized

Art Collection – 76% of planned acquisitions completed

Roads & Footpaths – 28% of road works completed, with 64.4% of footpath projects underway Parks & Streetscapes – 46% of planned improvements completed

Design works have also been progressing for the New Hamilton Gallery and Hamilton CBD revitalisation. The Melville Oval facilities Upgrade Project is now also 80% complete.

With momentum building and a strong pipeline of works still to come, Council will keep community informed on projects progress.

Of revenge and retribution.

This is a story about no one particular funeral.

There were two sides to old Merle's family just as there were two sides to the argument that had been tossed about over the decades. Exactly how long no one could actually say. The cycle of retribution had grown stale and then viciously flared over the years. Perhaps it had started when somebody had eloped with someone they shouldn't have. This was just one incident that was posited as to why there were 'strong feelings'. Allegedly water was stolen, fences 'damaged', the footy shed jacked up in the middle of the night and returned to its 'rightful' resting ground.

When it came to arrange Merle's funeral, delicate negotiations were the order of the day. Clearly no one side was going to 'win' and conversations were not helped by the lack of planning by Merle herself or a will.

Ultimately one side organised "The Church bit" and the other side organised "The Wake bit". It seemed an honourable compromise with both sides having a voice about some of the arrangements. It is hard to get some calming perspective in scenarios like this but what I return to is the prayer that was found by the body of a dead youth (one of an estimated 50,000) in the Ravensbruck concentration camp. Perhaps it would have gone down well at old Merles funeral?

"O Lord, remember not only the men and women of goodwill but also those of ill-will. Do not remember all the suffering they inflicted on us; remember the fruits we have borne thanks to this suffering – our comradeship, our loyalty, our humility, our courage, our generosity, our greatness of heart and when they come to judgement let all the fruits that we have borne be their forgiveness."

Of our Concrete Pylons

The idea for this little reflection came to me when I had the indulgence of visiting Stonehenge. Huge big chunks of stone in a circle, some capped with more blocks of stone.

It occurred to me that sometimes we are tempted to encircle ourselves with impenetrable lumps of grumpiness and 'hoomphiness'. Sadly I know this to be so, not only because I have seen it in others and myself.

This process is different to just having some time out to be by yourself to recharge, and revitalise because the aim then is always to come back re energised and restored.

When we surround ourselves with an edifice of concrete self pity and anger, the aim is to allow no-one else in and not to come out.. perhaps ever.

This is not a healthy way to exist and while we are hurting and smarting and we might feel self justified and self satisfied we become seriously close to self destructing and we are in fact being selfish.

Outside there are usually others who are concerned, worried and perplexed. 'Was it something I did, something I didn't do, could have, should have?' Where to now? What needs to happen and how can I help?

Some 'S' words that might be useful for the helpers. Sit in Silence. You don't have to say anything. Sometimes the dollop of silence brings its own form of healing and helps to erode, almost imperceptibly, the concrete slabs.

'Sorry' is another 'S' word. It's terrifyingly simple and yet often difficult to utter. Saying it will cost us and hurt us, yet I can think of no more effective way to begin the conversation that needs to happen. There are trained people whose gift is to release others from their Stonehenge and there are people who simply care, worry and pray.

A PAGE TO SHARE RECIPES

Moist Lemon Cake with Zingy Icing

Prep 15 mins Cook 50 mins Serves 10

INGREDIENTS

Icing

250g butter, chopped, at room temperature 215g (1 cup) caster sugar 1 tbsp finely grated lemon rind 4 eggs 250g (1 2/3 cups) self-raising flour

100ml fresh lemon juice

195g (1 1/4 cups) icing sugar mixture 1 tbsp lemon juice, plus 1/2 tbsp extra Finely grated lemon rind to sprinkle, optional

Method

· Step 1

Preheat the oven to 180C/160C fan forced. Grease a 20cm (base size) round cake pan. Line the base and side with baking paper.

· Step 2

Use electric beaters to beat the butter, sugar and lemon rind in a bowl until pale and creamy. Add the eggs, 1 at a time, beating well after each addition until well combined. Step 3


Use a spatula to fold the flour into the butter mixture until almost combined. Add the lemon juice and fold into mixture until just combined. Transfer to the prepared pan. Smooth the surface.

· Step 4

Bake for 50 minutes or until golden and cake springs back when lightly touched. Set aside in pan for 10 minutes to cool slightly before transferring to a wire rack to cool completely.

· Step 5

To make the icing, sift the icing sugar into a bowl. Add 1 tbsp of the lemon juice and stir until combined. (Add the extra 1/2 tbsp of lemon juice if necessary to reach a smooth, spreadable consistency). Spread over the cooled cake and sprinkle with the lemon rind, if using. Set aside for 2 hours or until icing sets. Serve.



200g butter, at room temperature 155g (3/4 cup, firmly packed) brown sugar 2 eggs 300g (2 cups) plain flour Step 1 - Preheat oven to 180C. Grease 2 baking trays with melted butter.

Step 2 - Use an electric beater to beat the butter and sugar in a large bowl until creamy. Add the eggs, 1 at a time, beating well between each addition until combined. Stir in the flour until combined. Use your hands to bring the dough together in the bowl.

Step 3 - Roll 2-teaspoons portions of the mixture into balls. Place, about 5cm apart, on the prepared trays. Use a fork to flatten slightly. Step 4 - Bake for 8 minutes or until golden and just cooked through. Set aside on the trays for 10 minutes to cool.

Optical Illusion Hand Drawing

This optical illusion hand drawing is a fun and simple design that you can decorate in endless different ways. Let's explore the steps of how I got to this final product!

Step 1: On a sheet of plain sketchbook or printer paper, trace your hand using a pencil. Make sure to add your wrist coming off the bottom of the page.


Note: You will most likely want to clean up your drawing a bit by smoothing lines and adjusting proportions. After tracing, I made the fingers a bit thinner and more realistically shaped.

When you are happy with the way the hand looks, take a ruler and draw evenly spaced lines all across the entire page from top to bottom, avoiding the area inside your traced hand.

Step 2: Using a black coloured marker, trace back over the straight lines with your ruler, including the spots in between the fingers of the hand. I prefer to use a Sharpie.



Be careful not to accidentally draw straight lines through your hand!
