#### Victorian Government lauds VDC upgrade

The Victorian Government has praised Penshurst's Volcanoes Discovery Centre for its substantial upgrade to its facilities which it says will draw more visitors to the region and give support to local businesses.

The project wouldn't have happened without \$290,000 from Victoria's Regional Tourism Investment Fund. The Southern Grampians Shire also gave \$40,000 to the project.

The upgrade includes a new outdoor geological interpretation area, a revitalised education space and refurbished internal displays.

The upgrades and new facilities will support the centre to provide school groups and visitors with a richer understanding of how volcanoes are formed, their geology, their history in the region, and how the indigenous people interacted with volcanoes.

Penshurst is at the centre of the Newer Volcanoes Province, the third largest volcanic plain on Earth, which stretches over an area of 15,000 square kilometres and contains over 400 small volcanoes and volcanic vents.

Victorian Tourism Minister, Steve Dimopoulos, said the Penshurst VDC's upgrade would encourage visitors to explore more of the region which is steeped in geological and cultural significance, including the nearby Budj Bim cultural landscape, a UNESCO world heritage site.

"Penshurst's landscape is a geological marvel and the upgrade to the VDC will help visitors learn more about this incredible patch of southwest Victoria. If you are into natural History, I encourage you to visit the centre and experience all of Penshurst's charms for yourself," he said.

Member for Western Victoria, Jacinta Ermacora, said the State Government investment was a big win for Penshurst, helping to attract more visitors, support local businesses and showcase the region's incredible volcanic and cultural heritage.

Southern Grampians Shire Mayor, Cr Dennis Heslin, said the shire was grateful for the State Government funding "which gave a much-needed boost to this very special institution".

"The Southern Grampians region is filled with ancient natural wonders that surprise and fascinate us. These upgrades will give us a chance to share the knowledge and stories we have with a wider audience," Cr Heslin said.

#### **COUNCIL INVESTS IN LOCAL ROADS**

Southern Grampians Shire Council continues to invest in the shire's roads with a recent Road Asset Condition Assessment examining road quality within the Southern Grampians.

The Road Asset Condition Assessment (RACAs), completed by external contractor Shepherd Asset Management Solutions, independently assesses road, footpath and carpark surfaces. Shepherd's is currently completing assessments across 30 Councils Australia wide, capturing more than 100,000 kilometres of road data.

The RACAs vehicle travels every kilometre of road in the shire. The tool produces high-definition digital photographs every 10m, as well as condition information such as surface roughness, and defects like edge-breaks, potholes, rutting, cracking, and more.

The Southern Grampians road network data is then reviewed by an experienced road engineer, and Artificial Intelligence, to determine any defects that exist as well as a ranking for each defect type. This data is then aggregated to give an overall condition for each segment.

Southern Grampians Shire Council Acting Mayor Afton Barber said the report assists Council to attain accurate data of each and every road in the shire and uses this to determine which roads should be given the highest priority for maintenance based on their condition and usage. This will enable Council to develop a five-year program to provide best value and strongest outcomes for the community.

"The data collected helps us to identify which roads are in the most urgent need of renewal or repair. This is also guided by safety and traffic usage data enabling us to make these a high priority. Likewise, it also tells us which roads are in really good condition," said Cr Barber.

"Using an assessment tool like RACAs gives us vital information to help manage our large network of roads and better manage our resources. Given the sheer size of our roads network, this is crucial to efficient road management.

"We were pleased to see how the condition of our roads compared to other Councils within the State and remain committed to providing our community with safe roads that support our community's needs.

"The work Council has been doing over the past few years to find efficiencies and cost reductions have allowed us to increase investment in our roads and spend in our capital works program. This investment goes a long way to improve road surfaces and footpath connections."

Shepherd Asset Management Solutions said their assessment accurately maps the condition of Southern Grampians road surfaces.

"We captured 1,655km of sealed roads, 938 km of unsealed roads, and 153km of pathways late last year across the Southern Grampians Shire. "Through this assessment, Council has improved their understanding of the state of their roads and footpaths and have further enhanced their ability to target maintenance and rehabilitation works, supporting best value for money across the Council area."

Acting Mayor Barber encourages residents to continue to report any problem areas across the Shire's Road Network. "I would encourage you to report any defects whether that be potholes or cracking for Council managed roads via our Report an Issue section on our website. Please report issues with VicRoads roads to them.

"As a Council we will continue to petition and advocate both on a State and Federal level for better funding for roads across our region and better roads for the safety of our communities," concluded Cr Barber.



#### Make Sure Your Furry Friends Are Registered by 10 April 2025

Southern Grampians Shire Council is reminding pet owners to register their cats and dogs by 10 April 2025, as part of responsible pet ownership. Registration is required for all cats and dogs over three months of age under the Domestic Animals Act 1994. Southern Grampians Shire Council Acting Mayor Afton Barber said registering your pet with the Council offers more than just compliance with the law—it directly contributes to a pet-friendly community. "By registering your pet, you're helping to support these important services that benefit the entire community," Cr Barber said.

Your registration fees help fund vital services and facilities, including: \*\* Hamilton Pound: A safe place for lost pets to be cared for until reunited with their owners. \*\* Veterinary support: Access to treatment for animals in Councils care. \*\* Food and bedding: Essentials for animals in our care. \*\* Staffing provisions: Ensuring we have sufficient qualified staff. \*\* Hamilton Dog Park: Off-leash and fenced area for dogs to play safely.

There can often be confusion between microchipping and registering your pets. Microchipping your pet is an essential step and is required under the DAA 1994, but it's not the same as registering them with the Council. While a microchip provides a unique identifier and contact details, registration ensures your pet is listed in the Southern Grampians Shire Council's official register. This makes it easier for Council to assist if your pet goes missing or needs urgent care.

You may qualify for a reduced registration fee if your pet meets any of the following criteria:

- \*\* De-sexed \*\* Has an obedience certificate issued by a government-approved organisation
- \*\* Over 10 years old \*\* Kept for working stock \*\* Kept for breeding by a registered domestic animal business proprietor.



Interesting glimpses into Penshurst's history - continued -

#### NAMING PENSHURST'S ORIGINAL STREETS, 1851

#### 7. KENNEDY STREET

Donald Kennedy was born in 1807 at Glenroy Lochaber Invernesshire and died 1864. He emigrated to NSW 1837, arriving Port Philip 1840.

Donald took up the "Croxton" run in 1842 with his brother Duncan. They also held "Linlithgow Plains". Donald was elected a Member Legislative Council in 1854 - serving until 1864. He promoted scientific agriculture and was president of the Pt. Philip Farmers Society, Commissioner of the Savings Bank, Deputy Governor of the Colonial Bank and a company director.

#### **8. MARTIN STREET**

Dr. Robert Martin JP was born in Skye,1798. After arriving in Australia he overlanded from the Murrumbidgee district, down the Hume and Hovell track, before following the Major Mitchell line to Mt Sturgeon, arriving 1841. He held Mt Sturgeon station until 1859. Martin was the first medical doctor in the district - he was also First Trustee of St. Johns Anglican church Heidelberg, built 1850. He lived across the Yarra river on his property "View Bank".


#### 9. RITCHIE STREET

James Ritchie was born 1812 Blyth Scotland. Ritchie and partner James Sceales took up the "Blackwood" run February 1842. By 1845 Ritchie had bought out his partner. He later purchased "Woodhouse" from Adolphus Sceales. When James was accidentally killed in 1857, as he was unmarried, his brothers Daniel and Simon took over the running of Blackwood and Woodhouse.

Daniel Ritchie was elected the first Mount Rouse Shire President in 1863.

#### **10. SCALES STREET**

James and Adolphus Sceales (Scales).

James arrived from Leith, Scotland where he had been a Chief Magistrate. He settled on Blackwood with James Ritchie 1842, selling out to Ritchie in 1845.

Adolphus held Woodhouse station from March 1848 to June

Colonial Secretary's Office, Melbourne, 9th September, 1851. PENSHURST.

NOTICE is hereby given that a site has been fixed upon for a Township at the undermentioned place, and that a copy of the approved Plan may be seen at the Surveyor General's Office, Melbourne, or at the Police Office at Hamilton, Grange Burn, viz:—

Penshurst, at the late Mount Rouse Aborginal Reserve.

> By His Excellency's Command, W. LONSDALE.

1854 He also leased the Kolor and Purdeet stations, surveyed from the Aboriginal Protectorate from September to December 1851. The runs were not stocked and he relinquished the leases, which ended up with David Hutton (Purdeet) and John and Daniel Twomey (Kolor).

#### **11. WATTON STREET**

Dr. John Watton (pictured below) arrived in Melbourne in 1839. The 1841 the census recorder



came first to John Watton's station, his 'address' given as Djerriwha... Weerabin'. [?] Simon Staughton purchased the Brisbane Ranges - Exford run from Watton shortly afterwards. Of the ten adults who were living and working at his station, five were shepherds, so this was clearly a substantial enterprise.

By July 1842 Charles La Trobe approved George Robinson's (Chief Protector of Aboriginals) plan for unsuccessful squatter Dr John Watton to take temporary charge of the Mount Rouse Reserve. The Government appointed Watton as a medical officer and not an assistant Protector - presumably as a financial saving. Dr. Watton was still at the Protectorate when it closed in 1849.

#### A PAGE TO SHARE RECIPES

#### Easy Whole Lemon Cake

Prep 20 mins Cook 1h 40 mins Serves 10

#### **INGREDIENTS**

2 lemons, washed

3/4 cup light olive oil

3 eggs

1 tsp vanilla extract

1 cup caster sugar

1 2/3 cups self-raising flour

1/2 tsp baking powder Double cream, to serve

Lemon syrup

1 cup caster sugar

1 lemon, thinly sliced

#### **Method**

#### Step 1

Preheat oven to 180C/160C fan-forced. Grease a 22cm (top) baba pan.

#### Step 2

Place lemons in a medium saucepan. Cover with cold water. Bring to the boil over high heat. Reduce heat to medium, Cook for 50 minutes or until softened. Drain. Cool 20 minutes. Chop lemons, discarding seeds.

#### Step 3

Place lemon in a food processor. Process to a

pulp. Add oil, eggs and vanilla. Process for 2 minutes or until smooth. Add sugar. Process to combine. Add flour and baking powder. Process until just combined. Pour into prepared pan. Level top. Bake for 50 minutes or until a skewer inserted into the centre of cake comes out clean. Cool in pan 15 minutes. Turn out onto a wire rack to cool.



To make the lemon syrup, place 1 cup water and caster sugar in a medium frying pan. Stir over low heat until sugar dissolves. Increase heat to medium-high. Bring to a simmer. Add lemon slices. Cook for 5 to 6 minutes or until syrup thickens slightly and lemon is translucent. Cool 15 minutes.

#### Step 5

Place lemon slices on cake. Drizzle warm cake with warm syrup. Garnish with lemon. Serve with cream.

Lemon sour cream icing	Make lemon icing: let cake cool completely
1 1/2 cups icing sugar mixture 1/4 cup Bulla Light Sour Cream 1 lemon, rind finely grated	Sift icing sugar into a bowl. Add sour cream and lemon rind. Stir until well combined. Pour icing over cake. Allow to set. Serve.
