Good morning everyone, notes from the SGSC at the PPA meeting last Wednesday.

- The Council intends to have the plan for the Cox Street project completed by the end of October.
- They were advised that the second flagpole at the roundabout required a lanyard. They will provide it before Remembrance Day.
- The Penshurst Pool was inspected by an outside business and given a clean bill of health. There are no leaks and no repairs need to be done, so it can be opened this summer. We then discussed the need to more clearly advertise when the pool is open, so a member of the PPA is going to contact HILAC to arrange for a flag/banner that will be flown in the centre of town saying that the pool is open.
- Will advised that a new 'Total Fire Ban' flag and a new Australian Flag are available to Kelly Hardware, to be used when appropriate in the round about.

At the last meeting the Council provided us with 3 rectangular metal signs, that fit beneath the 'Penshurst' signs on the edge of town which currently says 'Caravan Park Open'. The notices on them can be changed as required, at a cost to us by a sign business in Hamilton. The group discussed having pockets put on each so that the wording can be changed,

using the lettering we already have, rather than paying each time to list different events and dates.

Returning to the Council, Eda shared the proposed "Memorandum of Understanding" for the "Friends of .." group that will help manage the Green Space, Botanic Gardens, and other areas around the town. Anyone who joins the group will have a Council 'induction' and be issued with a yellow safety vest. They will be seen as SGSC workers, although they will all be volunteers. That gives them insurance for their activities. Trevor Hailey SGSC is the person to speak to at Council if you are interested in joining.

Eda also advised that any farmers having problems paying their rates etc, can contact the Council to arrange a payment plan.

Bushfire Place of Last Resort (BPLR) - The Council has agreed to designate the grassed space on the road reserve beside the Penshurst Memorial Hall in Watton Street as the new BPLR. The current site, behind the former Senior Citizens building in French Street, will be decommissioned and the sign moved. The CFA has advised that the new site had been assessed and found compliant. This will hopefully be complete before the upcoming fire season. The Hall will be open for community's use on extreme danger days, once a new community led committee to manage the building on those days is created. That is being organised at present.

Eda was asked to check with Darren Barber SGSC about the question asked at the last meeting - how the town Rates are used .. what percentage of the funds was used in the upkeep of Penshurst and what percentage is taken for Hamilton. We'll advise the answer when we receive it.

The PPA's Annual General Meeting will be on Wednesday 27th November, 7.30pm at the Hall. If you are interested in joining the committee and being on the management team, you have to join the Association before the October meeting. For more details contact me. Have a great fortnight. Ama Cooke.

### WEEKLY FOGO COLLECTION HERE IN TIME FOR SPRING

Southern Grampians Shire Council Food Organics and Garden Organics (FOGO) kerbside service will move to a weekly collection for residents this Spring.

From 2 September 2024, weekly collection will help residents to keep up with the quantity of spring growth and extra grass clippings that the warmer months produce in our gardens.

Southern Grampians Shire Council Mayor David Robertson said the FOGO kerbside service is a great way to divert food and garden waste from landfill.

“Springtime brings the heaviest usage of FOGO across the Shire, and we’re delighted to offer this extra service to help to keep the place looking spick and span.

“Council has been committed to promoting our sustainable solutions to reduce waste in landfill and the FOGO kerbside collection has had a very positive contribution to that.

“We know a lot of our residents show immense pride in their gardens, so offering a weekly service for the spring season will go a long way to support that maintenance.”

In 2020, Victoria wasted an astonishing 2.4 million tonnes of food. By 2030, Victoria has set the goal of slashing this to 1.2 million tonnes. Victorian households are the most wasteful in Australia, tossing around 250,000 tonnes worth of food per year. Stats reveal that the average Victorian household throws out approximately \$2,000 worth of food each year.

“We know the FOGO bins are great for small garden cuttings and grass clippings, but they also provide us with a sustainable opportunity to dispose of those hard to compost food items including bones, eggshells, tea bags and tea leaves, seafood shells, coffee grounds as well as pet fur and pet droppings,” said Cr Robertson.

As well as using the FOGO service, there are a number of ways to reduce food waste from ending up in landfill including the below helpful tips.

- Planning meals, shopping smart, cooking waste-free and storing food correctly to reduce food waste and save money.
- Storing food correctly keeps it fresher for longer. You’ll waste less, save money and help the environment.
- Composting kitchen waste: Composting uses the natural process of decomposition to convert organic waste matter into a nutrient-rich soil you can use in your garden. Reduce landfill, conserve resources and minimise greenhouse gases by composting your kitchen waste.

The draft Southern Grampians Sustainability Strategy is out now for community feedback with the Strategy remaining out for public exhibition for 30 days before going back to Council for consideration.

This is a key strategic document for delivering an environmentally sustainable Shire and will be foundational in shaping the future of the region.

The development of this Strategy provides Council the opportunity to take a strong leadership role in recognising and responding to climate change within our region. The strategy sets ambitious targets that align with State and Federal Governments emission reductions policies, as well as providing a roadmap for Council and the community to prepare our Shire for the challenges of a changing climate. Council will aim to be a carbon neutral organisation by 2035 and the Shire by 2041.

A wide range of organisations, community groups and schools have already contributed to the development of the draft Strategy with consultation recording 245 comments across six focus areas - Net Zero, Infrastructure, Waste, Water, Land Use & Biodiversity and Community.

Key themes from that community feedback now embedded in the draft Strategy include supporting green energy initiatives, zero to low emission transport, green transport options, street tree enhancement, preservation and protection of biodiversity, recycling and waste education in easy English, and more support for volunteers.

Feedback closes 5:00pm, Friday 13 September 2024.

There is a photo from the 1970's which shows two high school students sitting around doing what high school students tried to do in those days. To act cool and fail dismally in the process.

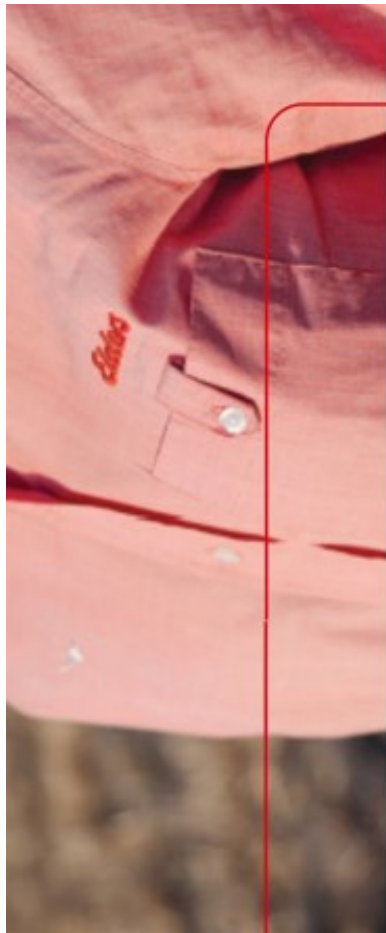

## A PAGE TO SHARE RECIPES

**Ham & Leek Potato Pie**

Prep Time 10 mins    Cook time 1 hour    Serves 6

## INGREDIENTS

8 brushed <a href="#">potatoes</a> , washed, thinly sliced	1 tbsp thyme sprigs
100g thickly sliced ham, chopped	1 cup (120g) coarsely grated cheddar
2 garlic cloves, thinly sliced	1/2 cup (125ml) thickened cream
1 brown onion, thinly sliced	1/3 cup (80g) sour cream
1 leek, pale section only, thinly sliced	1/4 cup (60ml) chicken stock

## METHOD

Step 1 - Preheat oven to 180°C. Grease a 6-cup (1.5L) ovenproof dish.

Arrange one-third of the potato in the prepared dish. Top with half the ham, garlic, onion, leek and thyme.

Sprinkle with one-third of the cheddar. Continue layering with remaining potato, ham, garlic, onion, leek, thyme and cheddar, finishing with the potato and cheddar.



Step 2 - Combine the cream, sour cream and stock in a jug. Season. Carefully pour the cream mixture over the potato mixture in the dish.

Step 3 - Bake for 1 hour or until the sauce thickens and the potato is golden brown and tender.

Step 4 - Set the potato gratin aside for 10 mins to rest before serving.

A suggestion - add 2 eggs to the cream mix before pouring it in. This helps to thicken the mix, and turns it into a whole meal, rather than just a side dish.

To help cook the potatoes through, begin by covering the dish in aluminium foil for the first 30 minutes. Remove the cover to allow the top to brown.

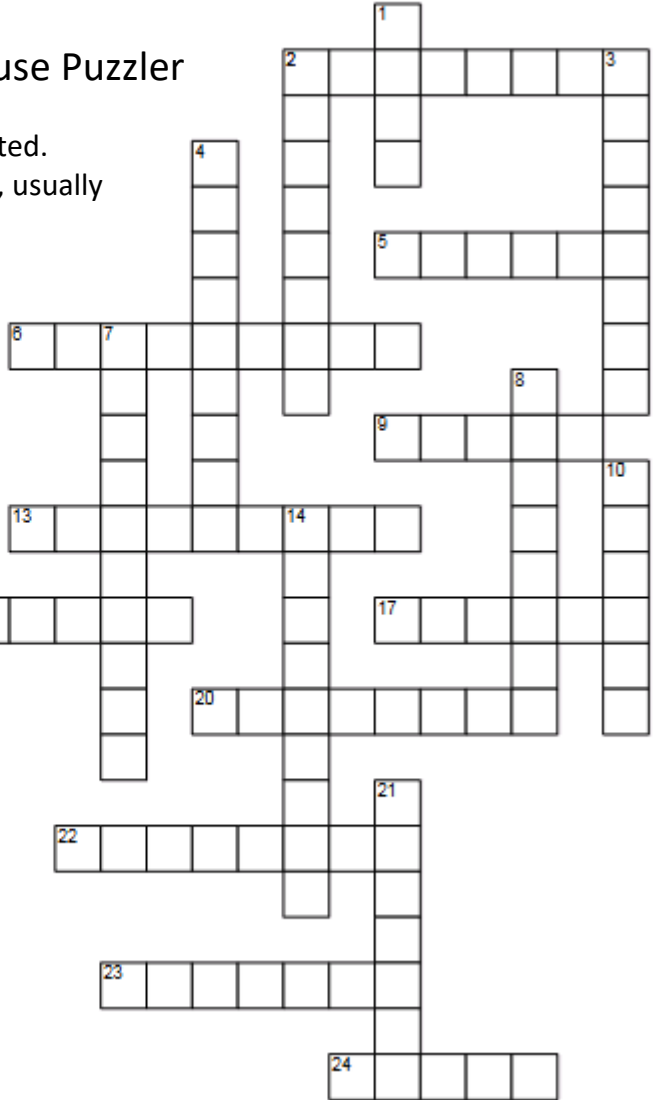

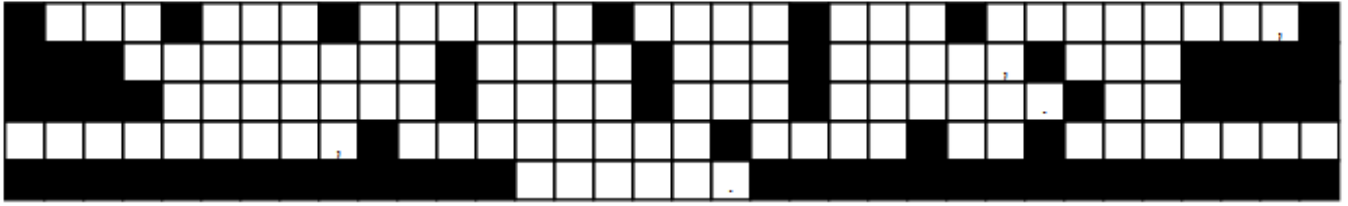

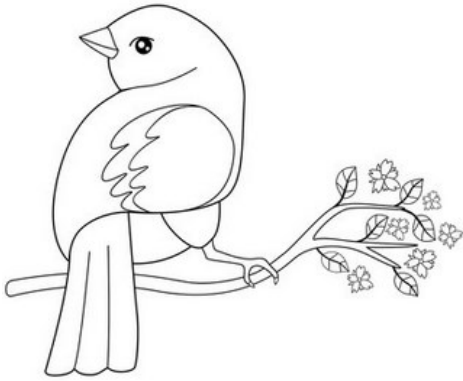
