
# **Historical Society 50th Anniversary**

# **Historical Society 50th Anniversary**

The historical society now has an extensive collection of Penshurst and district history and opens on the first Saturday of the month to answer queries about the town's history. It's especially helpful for people compiling their family history.

Researcher, Brian O'Brien, was successful this year in gaining a \$4000 award from the Public Records Office to digitise the Penshurst Free Press from 1919 - 1928. The microfilm copies of the Free Press are in the State Library who will send them to Trove to be digitised and put online.



"Trove has been a huge benefit for family historians - they can see what a town was like and what their family was experiencing through the local newspaper," Mr O'Brien said. "Unless you have family letters and diaries, then the only way you are going to see what society your ancestors lived in is the local newspaper at a particular time in the town's history.

"You will be able to place your ancestors in Penshurst in the 1920s and see what kind of society they were living in," he said. The Penshurst Free Press is already on Trove from 1901-1918.

"History is important because it teaches us valuable lessons about life and what our ancestors experienced and what we can learn from it," Mr O'Brien said. "It also shows us what the issues were that our ancestors faced at a particular time in Penshurst's history." He hopes that in future years the remaining 52 years of the Penshurst Free Press (1928-1980) will gain funding so it can be digitised and published on Trove. "It costs about \$4000-\$5000 per decade to digitise at today's prices, so we need at least another \$25,0000 to finish the Free Press. A wealthy benefactor would come in handy!"

The demise of country newspapers is also a worry about preserving future history - 200 country newspapers have closed in the past decade with the Hamilton Spectator being the latest after



announcing its final edition will be December 21.

"The demise of newspapers is a real worry to historians for many reasons, but the fact that it's such a valuable source of history is something that really concerns me. Last week's news is history - where are future events in the community going to be recorded so that someone in 50 years time can read what happened in 2024? Is what happens in society that is currently recorded in newspapers going to be recorded online and kept permanently - love to think so but strongly doubt it," Mr O'Brien added.

# **Council elect Heslin for mayor**

ON Wednesday, November 20 at 5.30pm a statutory meeting which lasted less than 20 minutes was held to elect the new Southern Grampians Shire Council (SGSC). Councillor Helen Henry moved the recommendation that the mayor should be appointed for a one-year term which Cr Jayne Manning seconded. The motion was passed unanimously.

SGSC chief executive, Tony Doyle, called for nominations for the position of mayor. To be elected, a mayor must achieve an absolute majority of council, which is four votes. Cr Adam Campbell nominated Cr Dennis Heslin for mayor and Cr Heslin accepted. No further nominations for the position of mayor were put forward and with further ado, Cr was declared the SGSC mayor for 2024/25.



A previous property investment business operator, Cr Heslin came seventh place out of eleven nominations having gained 716 first preference votes in the recent SGSC election. Cr Heslin said, "It certainly goes without say that this is a massive honour, a privilege and a seat I never thought I'd be sitting in ... I'll enjoy the challenges. "I'll be doing what the role is, and that's serving the community."

Cr Heslin expressed his gratitude to his wife, Katrina, "(My) number one supporter." "I'd first like to thank the community who felt I was worthy of being in this position. It started off with a small community, where we live in Penshurst, extended through to smaller communities, and of course, the big community here in Hamilton."

Cr Heslin acknowledged that seven people had been elected to represent the Shire who had demonstrated to one another their openness and readiness for good conversations, "Without diluting the respect for each other and the respect for the role that we have."

He wished to especially thank the executive team and said, "I've called on them for advice and words of wisdom along the way as well."

He went on to thank Council staff. "Just seeing someone in the street who says, 'I hope it all goes well for you', irrespective of who they voted for. "They were just very encouraging and supportive of someone who wants to embrace their community for the community to embrace me as well."

Cr Heslin addressed the councillors representing the Shire and said, "If I could suggest that we're two things—(and that) is available and able. There's a lot of experience there, and we'll certainly be calling on those that have come before us and those who haven't assumed these positions in the past as well. So, we'll be looking to embrace all the skills within all of the individuals that exist in our community. So, I am extremely grateful and looking forward to it so much ... thank you," the newly-elected mayor said.

The next point in the meeting would usually be the nomination and election of a deputy mayor, but the seven councillors (as per the Local Government Act 2020, with the provision to do so) decided not to nominate or elect a deputy mayor and to share the role of supporting the mayor amongst the other six.

# **Caramut and District Garden Club**

Sadly, this year we have seen below average rain fall and our gardens now require watering to keep them looking good. No amount of hand watering though seems to do as much good as a good soaking of rain.

Light watering, especially of shrubs and trees, only encourages the roots to stay on the top of the ground and they will blow over or die when it becomes hot and windy. If planting Australian trees, plant tube size plants in the wet spring surrounded by a tree guard — we used milk cartons. There is no need to water again as this encourages the roots to go down deep in search of moisture. We have done this on the farm, planting a thousand Wannon Falls seedlings a year and had great success.

A thick mulch prevents the soil from drying out in hot windy conditions. Give a good soaking at regular intervals to the garden beds. Vegetables need to be kept

moist at all times to give consistent growth with good taste at harvest time.



Like us, plants droop in the hot weather even when well mulched and watered, but once the day cools down, spring up again. It is a good idea to cover plants when the temperatures soar to stop burning of leaves and extreme stress.

There is a wizened gardener who grows tomato plants from seeds. Each year we are privileged to go and get some from him and you never know exactly what sort he has come up with. It's a real liquorice all sorts, a lucky dip sort of experience.

Each year we plant out these seedlings, we water, fertilise, wait and hope. I have to say that on the law of averages, the quality and abundance of fruit is always pretty good. I am sure this is due to the craftsmanship that has gone into nurturing these seedlings.

But... you just never know. There are no guarantees in this world, particularly when it comes to growing tomatoes in the garden. We simply plant, wait and hope.

It is like this with all things in the garden, fruit, veggies and flowers. There are no promises, no guarantees. You simply give it a jolly good try and you hope.

It's the same with relationships. You try, you work and then you hope. It seems nothing is happening and yet everything is happening. Sometimes it starts out robustly and then it falls over.

For one thing the cost to change it would be a dubious call on my limited finances and for another I consider myself fortunate to have lived this long. Long enough for my hair to become 'distinguished'. I've been to far too many funerals now of gentlemen who did not have the opportunity to ponder this transition.

So the service began and a mighty fine turnout it was. There was music and medals in abundance. The last post always sends goosebumps up and down my spine to say nothing of a slightly 'clogging feeling' in my throat.

The students who laid the wreaths were smartly turned out in their uniforms and I could not help thinking that the people we were honouring were not that much older than these fresh-faced adolescents. There was one excellent reflection about the unknown soldier, and it was rightly pointed out that while we can never know his name perhaps it is better that way for he symbolises everyone and is a reminder of our own mortality that we must all face one day.

If you are like me and you are sporting a silver fox hair do, remember these things. On Remembrance Day we pray for those who never had the opportunity to have the years of peace we have enjoyed.

to gender-based violence or orange in recognition of the 16 Days of Activism. Guest speakers will feature from Victoria Police, WDHS and Council and will be followed by a free sausage sizzle.

Southern Grampians Shire Council CEO Tony Doyle said the campaign is an important reminder that violence against women and children happens in our Shire and we can all take steps together to prevent it. "16 Days of Activism is an important time every year where we have the responsibility to have important conversations around the impact against gender-based violence has on our community. "We know statistically that gender-based violence is alarmingly high within the Southern Grampians so we have a lot of work to do as a community. "We know these conversations should be had year-round, but the 16 Days of Activism really puts a spotlight on what we are willing to accept as a community. It holds us responsible for having those difficult chats and challenges us all to look at the basic human right for equality. This is our time to say no.

"I encourage you all to get involved this year and make a visible stand. Join the walk against domestic violence, wear your purple and orange to show there is no excuse for gender-based violence within the Southern Grampians," concluded Mr Doyle.

In Australia, 23% of all women (1 in 4), have experienced domestic violence since the age of 15. Earlier this year Prime Minister Albanese declared Australia was facing a national crisis of violence against women, with one woman being killed every four days with the yearly figure at 58, up from 35 at the same time last year. Since his declaration, the figure has grown and alarmingly sits at 81 women murdered in 2024. While we recognise domestic violence against both Men and Women, locally Southern Grampians Shire was up 27.5% this financial year compared to last with over 75% of total incidents against Women.

The annual 16 Days of Activism Against Gender-Based Violence campaign begins on the International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women on 25 November and ends on International Human Rights Day, 10 December.

# Small Acts Make a Big Impact: Southern Grampians Shire Council Joins New Statewide Recycling Initiative

As part of a statewide push to improve recycling and sustainability practices, Southern Grampians Shire Council is partnering with Sustainability Victoria to launch a new campaign aimed at educating residents about enhanced recycling methods and services.

This initiative is a continuation of the successful Small Acts, Big Impact campaign, encouraging households to take small, meaningful actions that contribute to a more sustainable future. As part of the campaign, bin audits will be conducted at random throughout the Shire during November.

"This audit will allow us to see where we're doing well and where we can improve," said Southern Grampians Shire Council CEO Tony Doyle. "By identifying and reducing contamination in recycling and FOGO bins, we can divert more waste from landfill, conserve resources, and cut down on the environmental impacts of manufacturing with raw materials.

"All audits will be performed anonymously at random with no penalties or individual assessments to be issued, as the primary goal is to collect data that will shape future educational materials and programs. No data regarding the source of the waste material, or any identifiers in the waste will be recorded, only the volumetric and weight-based data by category will be documented."

Managed in partnership with Waste Services, these audits will help Council assess the types and levels of contamination in household waste, recycling, and FOGO (Food Organics and Garden Organics) bins. By gaining a clearer understanding of current recycling practices, Council can gain an ongoing understanding of the volume of waste being managed, as well as bin content to assist with planning and budgeting for waste services management.

"This forms part of our commitment as a Council to deliver sustainable outcomes within the Southern Grampians and to take a lead in shaping the future of circular economy in our region. We know we have a significant role to play in delivering sustainable projects and improving the impact our current practises have. We have done a lot of work in this space over recent years and will continue to improve practises wherever possible," concluded Mr Doyle.

With new recycling services and facilities set to launch across Victoria in the coming years, including statewide glass recycling, Council is committed to supporting residents as they adapt to these changes. By working together, Victorians will aim to divert 80% of waste from landfill by 2030. Cr Heslin said, "We feel it's a great way of just indicating to the community that we are embracing this role together. We may not always agree with each other, but we are one of the same." Cr Heslin said that while the decision would allow councillors to be specially positioned where their skills lie, he also acknowledged the decision was uncustomary.

"If it doesn't work, we can always change it, and we'll certainly take advice (from) those close to us and those far from us," he said.

Councillors were also appointed as representatives for the following committees: Audit and Risk - Crs Henry & Calvano; Planning - Crs Rainsford & Manning; Hamilton Regional Livestock Exchange Advisory - Crs Campbell & Rainsford; CEO Employment and Renumeration Advisory - Crs Heslin, Henry and Campbell; Hamilton Showgrounds Advisory - Crs Rainsford and Barber; Reconciliation Action Plan Working Group - Crs Heslin and Manning; MAV Delegate - Cr Rainsford, proxy Cr Calvano; South West Victoria Alliance - Crs Heslin and Manning; Rural Councils Victoria - Cr Heslin, proxy Cr Henry; Barwon South West Waste and Resource Recovery Group - Crs Henry and Manning; Green Triangle Action Group - Cr Campbell, proxy Cr Calvano; Rail Freight Alliance - Cr Rainsford, proxy Cr Barber; Ansett Museum Board - Cr Barber, proxy Cr Rainsford.

Council thanked retiring councillors for their hard work and commitment to the Southern Grampians community. "Council givers thanks to the outgoing mayor, David Robertson, and councillors for their commitment, dedication and for all their hard work across their Council term," Cr Heslin said. Cr Henry acknowledged the privilege of learning from more experienced outgoing councillors and paid homage to the late, former Cr Greg McAdam who passed during 2023.

Council will meet for the first meeting of their four-year term on Wednesday, December 11 at \$\\$5.30pm.

# Carbonara Pasta Salad

Prep Time 5 mins Cook time 5 mins Serves 4

# **INGREDIENTS**

250g dried Risoni pasta 150g streaky bacon rashers 2 baby cos lettuces 4 boiled eggs 20g (1/4 cup) shaved parmesan Creamy Dressing
125g (1/2 cup) sour cream
65g (1/4 cup) mayonnaise
2 tbsp fresh lemon juice
2 tsp Dijon mustard
1 bunch fresh chives

### Method

Step 1 - Put the kettle on. Heat a non-stick frying pan over medium-high heat. Fill one third of a large saucepan with water and place over high heat. Cover and bring to the boil.

Step 2 - While the water heats up, coarsely chop the bacon. Separate the lettuce leaves, rinse and drain well.

Step 3 - Pour boiling water from the kettle into pan of hot water. Cover and return to the



boil. Add pasta. Cook following packet directions for 2 minutes less than stated on the packet. Drain. Return to pan.

Step 4 - While the pasta is cooking, add the bacon to the hot frying pan and cook, tossing, for 2 - 3 minutes or until crisp.

Step 5 - As the pasta and bacon cook, place dressing ingredients in a jug, using scissors to snip in the chives. Whisk until well combined.

Step 6 - Arrange lettuce on a serving platter. Add 3 tablespoonfuls of dressing to pasta. Toss until combined. Scatter the pasta over the lettuce. Halve eggs and arrange on top. Drizzle over the remaining dressing. Scatter over the bacon and parmesan. Season and serve.

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

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
