# 26 November 2024 Help Shape the 2025 – 26 Council Budget

Southern Grampians Shire Council invites residents to contribute to the 2025/26 Council Budget, putting out the call for community budget submissions this week. Residents are encouraged to get involved early, to help inform Council on the services that are most important to them. Residents can participate in the budget engagement process by filling out the online submission form or completing a paper-based form available at our Brown Street Customer Service Centre. The engagement process will allow the 2025/26 Annual Budget to be considered by Council for adoption at the June 2026 Council meeting.



#### **Rumi's First Cousin**

Many years ago a future Sage named Rumi came from the North down to Persia and found his wondrous teacher who is known as Shams Tabrizi. Although these days Rumi is perceived as a great

poet, it is his transformation that is of note and not the fact that he was a beautiful wordsmith. Whatever be the trade of a Man it doesn't overly matter what that be because each person is gifted with the same potential to play out wizardry and integrity in their own particular microverse, it has zero to do with intelligence or status but is essentially an individual's CHARACTER that ultimately is the treasure worth carrying through life. In some great schools of thought it is said, 'work is worship', whether we see that as a relationship with God or just playing our part in the collective of Mankind is a personal



thing but the underlying idea is 'do it properly, whatever it may be, do it with dignity and grace' and that in itself has a sweetness about it, and makes the World a better place to wander in.

As part of the network of humanity we are all related in some way, thus the name 'Rumi's First Cousin' for these articles, so I shall tie my camel outside the pub and begin.

A scaled down reworked translation of the lines of one of Rumi's masterpieces tells us: Come, come whoever you are, ours is not a caravan of despair,

Even if you have broken your vows a thousand times, come...

As people, there is a tendency to break our vows, whether that be our New Years Resolutions, marriage vows, religious vows or even just the failure to keep our word in simple things in daily life. We fall down and it requires a little courage to get up, brush ourselves down and keep walking past the many oases that appear in life and move towards that which I would define as 'a greater destiny'; and that may just be a simple Peace of Mind, for others it would vary depending on their mindset, personal goals or belief system.

Each of us wanders through life, sometimes when things are tough it's like carrying a small torch in the dark and the batteries are pretty close to heading to the recycle bin, and on other days it's like a scene from a movie where the Sun has exploded on the horizon greeting a brand new day, the birds are whistling and even the trees are wobbling in time in the breeze, animals are nodding their heads smiling and one wonders whether they have entered Heaven on Earth. Such is the polarity of the experiences of life.

When I was younger and living in the city, I remember some mornings rushing off to get a cappuccino before work (back in the days when gluten free, lactose intolerant, turmeric, soya or yak milk lattes with drawings on the top were just a twinkle in the sky yet to take birth in the world of modern Man) there often would be what was discourteously named a 'bag lady', a homeless woman pushing a shopping trolley around the main park in the CBD with bundles of plastic bags full of her belongings. Surely treasures to her and no one else. No doubt people would cast their eyes in her direction and think 'poor lady', then go about their business crunching numbers and shuffling papers in the land where not so important things are considered important. Cities can be brutal and hypnotic if we are vulnerable and easily swayed by advertising and promises of wealth, fame and fortune. This striking image of the mysterious bag-lady is etched in my memory and as all things are our Teacher in life, as a young man seeing this, it helped shape me a little in understanding what truly has value.

As we age, we can see we are 'imprisoned by things' and really when we look closely at it, we are all bag-ladies. It is just that the shopping trolley is much bigger and shinier, our bags of collective objects are cleaner and supposedly more valuable, ultimately we drag this trolley through life. However, when we go out the Out-Shoot to the vast Unknown, the trolley stays behind, we know this but sometimes forget.

There is a wonderful story occasionally used by pundits in Central Asia. To understand the backstory, it is said in some religious cultures that if we remember the Name of God at our moment of passing, then our future will be blessed by that God.

There was once man who had a textile shop, fine satins and silks, he had six sons, so he fittingly named them according to his religious culture, Narayana, Gopala, Govinda, Madhava, Rama, Shiva (as opposed to Zedekiah, Nehemiah, Zachariah, Xavier, Bob or Apollonius) The day finally came for him to pass over. He was sitting up in bed and lovingly looked around the room and dearly says the name of each son with the deepest passion, then he pauses, looks dumbfounded and says, "who's minding the shop" and he dies.

And here again CHRISTmas is upon us, it comes around so fast like our washing on the Hills Hoist on a windy day and as the year passes never to return again, with its memories of joy, sorrow and indifference, we give thanks and may those in need experience the small joys of life which is essentially the Gift of Life itself, may those with abundance quietly in the background unknown to others go about their business like Santa's Elves and assist those in need.

#### A PAGE TO SHARE RECIPES

#### **Crispy Potato Salad with Blue Cheese**

Prep Time 10 mins Cook time 45 mins Serves 8

From taste.com.au

#### **INGREDIENTS**

1kg baby Red Royale potatoes

2 tbsp olive oil

2 tsp smoked paprika

1/2 cup (120g) Coles Sour Cream

1/4 cup (75g) mayonnaise

2 tbsp white wine vinegar

150g blue cheese, crumbled

1/2 cup finely chopped chives 1/4 cup coarsely chopped dill

200g sugar snap peas

200g snow peas

500g pkt frozen peas

8 short-cut bacon rashers, chopped

3 spring onions, thinly sliced

#### Method

#### Step 1

Preheat oven to 200°C. Line a baking tray with baking paper. Place potatoes on lined tray. Drizzle with oil. Season. Sprinkle with paprika. Toss to coat. Roast for 30 mins or until tender.

#### Step 2

Use a clean tea towel to gently crush each potato. Roast for 15 mins or until golden. Set aside to cool slightly.

#### Step 3

Meanwhile, place the sour cream, mayonnaise, vinegar and half the blue cheese in a food processor and process until smooth. Transfer

to a bowl. Stir in half the chives and half the dill. Season.



Cook combined peas in a saucepan of boiling water for 2 mins or until just tender. Refresh under cold water. Drain.

#### Step 5

Cook the bacon in a large frying pan over medium heat for 5 mins or until crisp. Transfer to a plate lined with paper towel. Set aside to cool.

#### Step 6

Arrange potato, peas, bacon, spring onion and remaining blue cheese on a platter. Drizzle with dressing. Sprinkle with remaining chives and dill to serve.

May your plate be full, and your heart even fuller, this Christmas.





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#### **Change of Emergency Shelter Options for Penshurst**

The Penshurst Emergency Management Committee met recently to further the work that has been in play for three years to ensure Penshurst residents have 'safer' places to shelter in the event of an emergency.

With common sense (finally!) prevailing, an excellent compromise was gained with the Southern Grampians Shire Council accepting to move the Bushfire Place of Last Resort to the grassed area adjacent to the Memorial Hall on Watton St. The new signs will be up soon. The original BPLR site on French Street behind the Senior Citizens Hall is understood to become decommissioned. It is unclear the timeframe. As long as the signs are still up Penshurst has both grassed areas as designated BPLRs.

(A BPLR is a (formal) Place of Last Resort for when your plans have failed. It is an area or premise that provides separation distance from vegetation and protection from direct flame contact and excessive lifethreatening levels of radiant heat – but does not guarantee safety.)

Given the Memorial Hall is adjacent to the newly designated BPLR – it makes even more sense for the Hall to become an **Informal Place of Shelter. This means the Hall provides an additional communal option to consider as part of individual plans for sheltering in an emergency situation.** New signs will be up on the Hall soon to indicate how to access the Hall in case of an emergency. The PEMC is working with the Hall committee to ensure this will be ready by the end of the year.

#### The Hall was selected for the following reasons:


- The Hall and the grounds immediately outside were assessed in 2022 by CFA in accordance with Bushfire Place of Last Resort Requirements. This assessment concluded a sufficiently low radiant heat impact that allows the hall to be considered as a shelter option.
- The Hall has a large indoor space with amenities, including disability access.
- Is in a central location away from the fringe of town.
- Is on the main tourist thoroughfare.
- The Hall has been used successfully in significant past emergency events (1977 fires) for the community to gather, assist one another and provide support.

Majority of the community believe it to be the most appropriate community space to gather in the event of an emergency.

#### The Hall will be open:

- On days of Fire Danger Rating (FDR) level Extreme & above.
- On days of Total Fire Ban (TFB)

#### When an emergency occurs



Now that these changes have been confirmed, the Penshurst Emergency Management Guide is being finalise and will be posted to all Penshurst residents in the coming week to ensure all residents have the information they need to assist with their own bushfire/emergency plans.

#### We had a visitor the other night

Sounding something like a musical instrument, the Pobblebonk is one of Victoria's most well-known frogs. Scientific name - Limnodynastes dumerili

Did you know? The Pobblebonk is a burrowing frog. With its powerful hind legs, it can dig backwards into the ground where it can remain until it rains. Females use their legs to

beat their egg clutches into a frothy mass that floats on the water surface. The Pobblebonk is sometimes known as the Banjo Frog due to the banjo-like 'plonk' or 'bonk' sound it makes.

Description - Pobblebonks can grow up to 8.5 cm in length. They vary in colour from grey, olive brown to dark brown with blackish patches and marbling, with a distinctive white cheek stripe. Skin texture can vary from smooth to warty. The fingers and toes of the Pobblebonk are not webbed, but they have a shovel or spade-like structure on their hind toe that helps them dig.

Diet - The Pobblebonk follows the typical diet of most frogs, feeding on insects, worms and spiders.

Habitat - Pobblebonks occupy wetlands, rivers, farms and dams. They occur throughout Tasmania, Victoria and along the east coast of News South Wales. The Pobblebonk is found throughout most of Victoria as well as being widespread over the western and northern areas around Melbourne. They live in our vegetable garden.

#### Frog and Toad

A frog leap-frogs over a swamp log;


A toad does not do diddy-squat. A frog has skin that's smooth or slimy:


